



### **MEASURING OUR IMPACT:**

### **SOCIAL RETURN ON INVESTMENT**

Partnering with Social Ventures Australia (SVA) we use the Social Return on Investment (SROI) methodology to understand, measure and value the impact of the NRL Programs in the community.

A SROI is a cost-benefit analysis to determine the effectiveness and value of our community programs, and the social impact they create in the community. When the total investment is compared to the value created, the result is an SROI ratio of 1:4.7.

That is, for every \$1 invested in each of our programs, the average of **\$4.70** was generated in social return across the four marquee programs evaluated.

From the activities delivered, the total social value created for participants and the community was over \$14.85M. The NRL brand allows NRL programs to engage with hard-to-reach regions and demographics. Using current and retired players, the 'language of league' and ball-in-hand activities, our community programs received a high level of engagement from participants within topics such as mental health and domestic violence.

The following section of this report presents the findings of an evaluative SROI analysis that looks at the investment made by NRL Community in four marquee programs and the outcomes experienced by the beneficiaries in 2023.

# THE PACIFIC

The Voice Against Violence (VAV) program is a violence prevention initiative delivered across Australia and the Pacific that aims to assist the rugby league community to stand up, speak out and take action to prevent violence against women and children.

VAV is delivered to rugby league teams, clubs and communities across Australia and four Pacific nations of Fiji, Samoa, Tonga and Papua New Guinea with the intention of sharing critical messages regarding domestic and gender-based violence in cultural contexts. Participants are provided with insights into what domestic violence is, the different forms of abuse, the consequences and actions we can put in place to prevent it.

VAV created a new partnership with Relationships Australia Canberra Region 2023. It is a fee-for-service model with a focus of delivering to schools and junior rugby league clubs across Canberra and NSW Riverina areas. The Melbourne Storm Club also entered into a partnership with VAV to deliver workshops throughout Victoria and their organisation.

In 2023, the State of Mind program offered health and wellbeing programs across all ages, including the 18+ GRASSROOTS workshop, 13-17 year (high schools) "Get in the GAAME" and 5-12 year (primary schools) "League Stars INSPIRE". Now in its ninth year, State of Mind has positively impacted a total of 477 community rugby league clubs, 161 schools, delivered 638 workshops to 20,000 participants across Australia.

The NRL INSPIRE – Respect, Health & Wellbeing and Inclusion & Diversity modules aim to provide interactive learning experiences that inspire our young people.

With a focus on respect, responsibility and inclusiveness, the NRL's In League In Harmony (ILIH) program aims to promote social cohesion by addressing issues such as social disengagement, racism, gender inequality and bullying; empowering youth to be agents of change for a more cohesive society.

The program is delivered over a period of six school-based sessions which culminate in a celebratory Gala Day. The In League In Harmony program's delivery method is a non-formal educational approach. It is achieved by using rugby league as the vehicle to educate key competencies of individuals and groups to contribute to personal development and sustainable social change.



Taimana is a proud Aboriginal man from the Worimi tribe of the Port Stephens NSW region and was born and raised on Awabakal Worimi lands in Newcastle NSW. He is a remarkably talented and gifted athlete across multiple sports and is often selected as team captain because of his hard working, humble and dedicated nature to his sports and schooling.

Taimana currently attends Hunter Sports High School for rugby league as part of the school's talented sports program. In 2022 Taimana was selected to attend the NRL Indigenous Youth Leadership Summit, along with 68 Indigenous youth from around the nation. During this summit he was elected by his peers as the male Indigenous Youth Ambassador. As a Year 12 student, and current School Captain of his High School, he has represented the school, region, and state for six years in athletics, cross country, rugby league, rugby union & touch football. Notably at the end of year school assembly, Taimana was named as one of 12 athletes (from a possible few hundred athletes at the school) for the prestigious naming of Hunter Sports High School's athlete of the month. His recent major selections include being named in the Australian 18s Touch Football team which competed in the Asia Pacific Games in Brisbane (May 2023) winning Gold

against New Zealand, named in the 2023 NRL Indigenous All Star Opens Touch Team (Feb 2023) where he travelled to Rotorua, New Zealand to play before the Indigenous v Māori All Stars Rugby League game and he was named in both the NSW Combined High Schools (CHS) teams for the Boys Opens touch football for the second consecutive year and NSW CHS Rugby Union team.

Taimana wishes to continue his sporting dreams in rugby league, rugby union & touch football. His passion is to represent at the highest levels in one or all three codes. He wishes to also further his studies in Communications & Media / Sports Journalism. Being part of the NRL School to Work program has provided many opportunities to spread his wings wider within the culture, community and leadership spaces.

The NRL School to Work program gave him the confidence to be a role model, make positive change, and (after gaining the ambassador role) he was successful in being elected school captain. Taimana is wise and his advice to other young people is to be proud of who you are, stand up for what you believe in, be respectful, be humble, be kind and know that anything is achievable if you work hard and stay committed to your goals.



### **Canterbury- Bankstown Bulldogs**

### **FOCUS AREAS**

The Canterbury-Bankstown Bulldogs 2023 community key focus areas were:

### **Health and Wellness** > Education > Cultural Diversity

### **Community Programs**

390 000 people in the club's community were positively impacted by the Bulldogs' Health and Wellness programs. This was achieved through 24 Community based programs.

### **Health and Wellness Focus**

Apparel, such as club t-shirts, Indigenous designed boots, and the donation of clothes from laundries and boots on match day were used to raise awareness of the importance of Health Checks for First Nation supporters, Indigenous Youth Mental Health and Homelessness. This was achieved through the **Deadly Choices, Boots for Brighter Futures, Shoe Drive Appeal** and **Laundry Christmas Appeal**.

Healthy eating and sport participation programs, such as the **Junior League Blitz**, were delivered to schools in the local catchment and in Queensland's Bundaberg Region - reaching almost 6000 students.

The mental health of over **4500 rural and metropolitan students** was targeted through the Changing Rooms program run by Canterbury Legend Paul Landmark and social workers. The message to stay positive and avoid worrying underpinned the program.

### **Community Programs**

Over **25 000 people** were educated on the **power of forgiveness** through the **i4Give Cup** between the Bulldogs and the Eels. This initiative was inspired by the tragic passing of four children, whose parents publicly forgave the drunk driver in 2020.

Almost **100 Bundaberg students** were inspired by the Bulldogs launched music competition which allowed aspiring artists to share their creative talents in a supportive environment.

NSW Police were educated by Bulldogs' General Manager of Football, Phil Gould, on Leadership. The Bulldogs were proud to host **30 Local Area Commanders** for a night of inspiration.

Education of over **372 000 local residents** through the **Anti-Dumping Program**, focused on the importance of waste clean-up in an attempt to reduce the amount of illegal dumping in 2023.

### **North Queensland Cowboys**

### **FOCUS AREAS**

The North Queensland Cowboys 2023 community key focus areas were:

### **Education Health and Wellbeing**

### **Community Programs**

Almost 20000 people have been positively impacted by the community engagement program of the North Queensland Cowboys. Almost 300 hours of community engagement was delivered to the community by Cowboys players and almost 700 hours were donated by club ambassadors.

### **Education Focus**

Over 1000 participants across 52 schools were positively impacted by the Cowboys' Adopt a School program.

Through classroom visits, playground activities and promoting **The Cowboys Way** children were focused on aligning positive behaviours with the values and ethos of the Cowboys.

For over 5000 students, school attendance was a focus across 16 schools in 2023, through the Cowboys Try for 5! program. This program motivated and rewards individual classes and schools for their attendance record.

1380 students across 14 secondary schools in North Queensland have received the Cowboys' Try Time! Modules. This program focused on using player profiles and experiences to model the discussion of emotions and mental health.



### **Community Programs**

Over 10000 participants benefited from the Dragons' Health and Wellbeing, Social Inclusion and Charity Partnerships programs in 2023.

77 Game on Game Day experiences were offered to charity partners to attend NRL Dragons home games. This assisted in building stronger partnerships with local charities in the area.

Almost \$50 000 was raised by the Dragons for a variety of local charities.

### **Player Impact**

### **Community Programs**

Over 800 youth were positively impacted by a variety of community programs run by the Sydney Roosters in 2023.

Two Indigenous students from the NRL's School to Work Program designed the Roosters Indigenous Training t-shirts. First People Project, started in 2018 by Angus Crichton, was supported by five first grade players in 2023, to mentor Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander boys and girls in boarding school.

### **Community Programs**

Rooster recognised the need to support youth in schools through Rugby League. This ensured male and female Roosters players conducted school visits across 12 Sydney Schools through: School Blitz's and OOSH Clinic activities in school holidays.

Prizes and incentives donated for PCYC Bush to Post schools assisted with increasing school attendance across 40 students.

**30 Central Coast Junior Club coaches** were given an opportunity to improve their skills in a Coaching Clinic led by NRLW coach John Strange.

### **Environment Focus:**

In August 2023, Roosters joined Waverley Council's Net Zero Alliance, committing to support and assist Waverley Council in achieving its community target of net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2035. The New Zealand Warriors 2023 community key focus areas were:

### Physical & Mental Wellbeing > Education > Game Development

### **Community Programs**

Warriors' community programs have reached over 17,000 participants in 2023 including youth and adults.

118 schools and clubs have experienced the Warriors' Community engagement programs.

### **Health and Wellbeing Focus:**

In order to address **rising child obesity rates**, Warriors' **Prepare to Perform program** focused on nutrition, sleep and hydration through presentations in **41 schools**, targeting almost **10 000 students**.

Recognising the high suicide rates in New Zealand, the Tupu Maia program was implemented and run with teenage girls, focusing on **strengthening their mental and physical health**. The program generated confidence, promoted wellbeing actions and linked students with pathways to local Rugby League clubs.

### **Education Focus**

Through the League in Libraries initiative, the Warriors hosted a Rugby League Creative Writing competition, **focusing on rising Literacy engagement in New Zealand schools**. 365 students submitted a Warriors based story; the best three stories were published. The competition promoted a love of writing and reading and a sense of accomplishment in Primary and High School students.

### **Game Development Focus**

The Warriors **established wheelchair Rugby League** in New Zealand, with **seven sessions involving twelve participants** in 2023. Partnerships between NZRL, Disability Sport Auckland, CMRL and ARL ensured participants learned skills, participated in drills and experienced the game of Rugby League with their wheelchair.

**Three coaching workshops**, involving **120 participants**, were implemented by the Warriors for coaches to learn new skills and grow in confidence to coach Rugby League in schools and clubs.

Over **2000 children** benefited from Rugby League skills, drills and games as part of the Warriors' Have a Go Days, Family Days Muster Days and Roadshows. The aim was to familiaris

Days, Muster Days and Roadshows. The aim was to familiarise students to the rules, skills and joy of Rugby League to increase Junior Club enrolments.

Rugby League games for children were hosted on Warriors' Game Days, including mini mods, relay races and passing activities to promote ball skills and physical activity.

Stadium tours and involvement in a **Game Day Guard of Honour** ensured students were able to be part of the Game in unique and memorable ways.

NRL's Road to Regions program allowed Warriors players and ambassadors to take part in numerous community visits in the Napier Region, promoting healthy eating and physical education.
