Message from the School to Work Operations Manager - Jason Solomon



Creating the Next Generation of Leaders at the Western Sydney University Inspire Camp

In the spirit of this year's NAIDOC theme 'Keep the Fire Burning! Blak Loud and Proud!' School to Work held an inspire camp in collaboration with Western Sydney University, which emphasised the sense of belonging within the School to Work Program.

The first of its kind to be held in the region, the camp was held over three days at the WSU Hawkesbury Campus, the camp aimed to help participants explore future pathways to higher education while furthering connection to culture.

Students got a glimpse into university life, allowing them to engage in a variety of workshops and activities. From interactive sessions with faculty members to a range of cultural sessions, participants truly immersed themselves in the academic environment of university.

Joel Thompson from the NRL State of Mind Program joined us to speak with the students about stress management. From this session, students took away some powerful skills and techniques on how they can manage their stress moving forward.

Highlighting the significance of cultural connection, the WSU Inspire Camp provided students with opportunities to learn more about their culture through yarning circles, allowing students to open up about their own personal experiences and cultural identity. Over the three days, students also learned and practiced the art of traditional dance, concluding the camp with a performance at our presentation lunch.



Lachlan, a proud Wiriadjuri man with aspirations of becoming a doctor, started a Bachelor's of Sports Science at the University of Newcastle this year chasing that very dream. After joining the NRL School to Work Program in 2022, Lachlan has taken every opportunity with both hands and this scholarship was no different.

The Lotte Weiss Scholarship is funded by brothers Gary and Johnny Weiss who both have a passion for supporting First Nations communities and this scholarship is one of many initiatives that they are involved with. The scholarship totalling \$10,000 and is awarded to a first-year university student who is a part of the NRL School to Work Program to support them as they transition into tertiary education.

This is the third year of the Lotte Weiss Scholarship with the calibre of applications continuing to grow each year. Lachlan was selected based on his outstanding academic achievements, community engagement and desire to positively impact the wider community.

Over 40 First Nations students participating in the NRL's School to Work Program attended a career expo at AAMI Park earlier in the week to help them prepare for their future aspirations and career pathways after completing high school. The interactive day gave Year 11 and 12 students exposure to various organisations offering career and employment opportunities, and further educational pathways they may be interested in as they transition from school into their chosen career.









Catering to all passions within the group, students heard from a range of companies including, Suburban Rail Loop Authority, Laing O'Rourke, Wamarra, Mob Jobs, Accor, Victoria University, Kmart/Target and Veolia.

Students from Thornbury High School, Hallam Senior College, University High, Reservoir High School, Sunbury College, Point Cook Secondary College and Gleneagles Secondary College commenced the day with a smoking ceremony from Wurundjeri man Alex Kerr on the AAMI Park concourse, before hearing from current and rising stars of Melbourne Storm.

Storm First Nations Academy players Gabriel Satrick and Matthew Hill spoke to the students about their journeys to where they are today and what it has taken to pursue their ambition of playing NRL.

Club captain Harry Grant and Xavier Coates also spoke to the students about their career journeys and students learnt that Xavier Coates is studying a Bachelor of Education at University saying "You don't want to just be known as an NRL player, you want to be known as a good human being first and foremost.

The camp was held over three days at the University of Canberra and offered students a glimpse into university life, allowing them to engage in a variety of workshops and activities tailored to encourage students to consider alternative pathways. From campus tours to interactive sessions with faculty members, participants immersed themselves in the academic environment of the University of Canberra.

Highlighting the significance of cultural connection, the UC Inspire Camp provided students with opportunities to learn more about their culture through on-country experiences and Story Ground sessions led by Dr. Paul Collis. It also provided students with opportunities to share their own knowledge and experiences with their peers in a Yarning Circle facilitated by Jamal Fogarty. These sessions provided a platform for students to explore and celebrate their Indigenous heritage, fostering a deeper understanding of cultural identity and pride.

Another important moment during the camp was the visit to the Vincent Namatjira Exhibit at the National Gallery of Australia. This exhibition offered students a valuable insight into contemporary Indigenous art, showcasing themes of history, identity, and social commentary through Namatjira's artwork.

The Canberra Raiders played a pivotal role in the camp by offering exclusive insights into careers in sport and connecting students further with the Canberra Raiders community. A tour of the Canberra Raiders Centre provided students with firsthand knowledge of the operations behind a professional NRL team, while a visit to GIO Stadium allowed the students to join the NRL team for their Captains Run, furthering that connection to community.

The conclusion of the UC Inspire camp was marked by a presentation at GIO Stadium, followed by attending the Round 15 Raiders v Cowboys game. This experience not only celebrated the achievements of the participants but also emphasised the sense of belonging within the Canberra Raiders community.

As the UC Inspire camp concluded, participants have furthered their cultural connection and Identity. The camp has empowered a new generation of leaders who are poised to make a positive impact in their communities and beyond.
